 Otto meets three mysterious sisters and suddenly finds himself entwined in a puzzling quest involving a prophecy, a promise, and a harmonica. Decades later, Friedrich in Germany, Mike in Pennsylvania, and lvy in California each, in turn, become interwoven when the very same harmonica

lands in their lives

- A Night Divided by Jennifer Neilsen. With the rise of the Berlin Wall, Gerta finds her family divided overnight!
- Tusla Burning by Anna Myers. The day he buried his pa, Nobe Chase lost everything—his father, his home, and his dog, Rex. Worst of all, he had to move into town to live with Sheriff Leonard—dog killer, wife stealer, and secret lawbreaker of all sorts.
- Crossing the Wire, by Will Hobbs. A young boy and his friend escape the perils of Mexico and find new dangers in the U.S.
- Chasing Lincoln's Killer by James Swanson. A fastpaced thriller about the pursuit and capture of John Wilkes Booth: a wild twelveday chase through the streets of Washington, D.C., across the swamps of Maryland, and into the forests of Virginia.

- Boys Who Rocked the World:
 Heroes from King Tut to
 Bruce Lee and Girls Who
 Rocked the World: Heroines
 from Joan of Arc to Mother
 Teresa By Michelle McCann
 It's never too soon to start
 making a difference and these collections of influential
 stories show strong role models, whom impacted the world
 as teenagers or younger.
- Paulson. This children's author and participant in the Alaskan Iditarod describes his relationship with special dogs in his life.
- Yellow Star, by Jennifer Roy This novel in verse relates the true story of one of the twelve surviving children of the Lodz ghetto in Poland..
- Small Steps, by Peg Kehret. In 1949, at the age of twelve, Peg Kehret (then Schulze) became the only child in Austin, Minnesota to contract polio. She details the intense fear and horror the disease evoked in her and others.
- Knucklehead: Tall Tales and Mostly
 True Stories About Growing Up, by Jon
 Sciezka. The author of the Stinky
 Cheeseman and Math Curse writes
 about growing up one of six boys and
 the trouble that goes with it.

MYSTERIES

- Among the Hidden: Shadow Children Series, by Margaret Peterson Haddix. Luke has never been to school and does not have any friends. When he meets Jen, a child like himself, will he risk everything to come out of the shadows?
- Missing Series by Margaret Peterson Haddix. One night a plane appeared out of nowhere, the only passengers aboard: thirty-six babies. As soon as they were taken off the plane, it disappeared.
- Tunes for Bears to Dance to by Robert Cormier. Henry works for Mr. Hairston, a miserable old man. He tries to find moments of peace until his boss asks him to do the unthinkable.
- Eddie Red Undercover by Marcia Wells. Not many sixth-graders work undercover for the NYPD, but Edmund Xavier Lonnrot, code name Eddie Red, is not just any sixth-grade
- On the Run Series, by Gordon Korman. Aidan and Meg Falconer are their parents' only hope. The Falconers are facing life in prison – unless Aidan and Meg can follow a trail of clues to prove their innocence.
- Hidden Talents, by David Lubar.
 When thirteen-year-old Martin
 arrives at an alternative school
 for misfits and problem students,

 with psychic powers and discovers something surprising about
 himself.
