
Aged to perfection!! 1st grade celebrated the 100th day of school!

- Afternoon optional activities are for students who are not in assigned small groups.










February 23 was the 100th day of school

How to look for teacher comments on your child's work on Seesaw

In order to view comments on work that has been approved (or sent back), click on the inbox in seesaw (speech bubbles), and then click on the notifications tab. This will open up a list of all of the items approved, sent back, and commented on.

Additionally, there are two spots where student work is "held". Their "To Do" section is current assignments that need to be done. This has a green checkmark logo. Underneath that is an "In Progress" section which has an orange checkmark logo. If students have started an assignment but saved it to finish later this is where you will see it. This should be monitored to be sure all work is completed in a timely manner.

Zones of Regulation

When was the last time you "checked in" with yourself? During this "check-in" take time to notice how your body feels- is your heart racing or calm, are your muscles tense or relaxed, what are you thinking

guide you in what to do with these feelings! When you are in the Green Zone, you are ready to learn! When you are in the Blue, Yellow or Red Zone, you may need to use a coping strategy to help get back to Green! Some suggestions include deep breathing, doing 10 jumping jacks, counting to 10, or drawing. Try different strategies to find what works best for you!



A Literary Essay on Each Kindness by Jacqueline Woodson and Say Something by Peggy Moss Saketh 2/25/2021

It is important to stand up for others and always do the right thing. I will compare and contrast the two books <u>Each Kindness</u> by Jacqueline Woodson and <u>Say Something</u> by Peggy Moss. In the books Each Kindness by Jacqueline Woodson and <u>Say Something</u> by Peggy Moss, both of them show how it is important to stand up for others and always do the right thing.

Each Kindness and Say Something are similar in many ways. For example, in both Each Kindness and Say Something students were bullied. For instance, in the book Each Kindness Maya said, "It's a high bouncer. But none of us wanted to play." This is showing that Chloe and her friends weren't playing with Maya and they just left her alone. Also, in the book Say Something the narrator says, "There's another kid in my school who gets teased. He gets called names." This shows that a kid was getting bullied by getting teased and being called names. Another reason that shows how these books are similar is that the main characters both learn lessons about kindness. For instance, Chloe realizes that she shouldn't have bullied Maya and should have acted kind back towards Maya. For example, Each Kindness says, "Each morning I walked to school slowly hoping this would be the day Maya returned." Chloe is hoping she returns so that she can act kind towards Maya. All of this evidence shows how Each Kindness and Say Something are similar.


The books <u>Each Kindness</u> by Jacqueline Woodson and <u>Say Something</u> by Peggy Moss are also different in many ways. For instance, in <u>Each Kindness</u>, Chloe learned her lesson about kindness too late but the girl in <u>Say Something</u> learned her lesson sooner and was able to show kindness. For example, the book <u>Each Kindness</u> said, "I watched the water ripple as the sun set through the maples. And the chance of a kindness with Maya became more and more forever gone. This is showing that Chloe learned her lesson but it is too late to do anything. In the book <u>Say Something</u> the narrator said, "On the bus the next day, I sat next to the girl who always sits alone. She's really funny!" This is showing that the narrator showed an act of kindness to the girl and she learned her lesson about kindness.

<u>Each Kindness</u> by Jacqueline Woodson and <u>Say Something</u> by Peggy Moss are also different because only one person is bullied in <u>Each Kindness</u> but multiple people are bullied in <u>Say Something</u>. For instance, the book <u>Each Kindness</u> said, "Every day we whispered about Maya. Laughing at her clothes, her shoes, the strange food she brought for lunch." This is showing that Chloe and her friends are bullying Maya, but only Maya, not anyone else. Also, in the book <u>Say Something</u> the narrator says, "There's a kid in my school who gets picked on all the time. I think he's sad. There's another kid in my school who gets teased. He gets called names. When he's moving through the halls, kids push him and tell him he's slow." This evidence shows that multiple people are getting bullied in the school. All of this evidence shows how <u>Each Kindness</u> by Jacqueline Woodson and <u>Say Something</u> by Peggy Moss are also different in many ways.

Both the books <u>Each Kindness</u> by Jacqueline Woodson and <u>Say Something</u> by Peggy Moss show how it is important to stand up for others and always do the right thing. I think people should have stood up for Maya when she was being bullied in <u>Each Kindness</u>. Also, when the narrator was being bullied in <u>Say Something</u>, the kids that were seeing it happen should have stood up for the narrator and stopped the bullies. In both the books <u>Each Kindness</u> by Jacqueline Woodson and <u>Say Something</u> by Peggy Moss people were bullied. Other people didn't stand up for the people who were being bullied.
