Holi is the traditional Hindu festival that celebrates the beginning of Spring, and the triumph of good over evil.

The Holi festival started in India, but today it is celebrated all over the world. Every year, the festival takes place over two days. It begins at the full moon of Phalguna (a month in the Hindu calendar). Phalguna often falls between the months February and March. This year, the Holi festival will take place on Sunday, March 28 to Monday, March 29, 2021.

The first day of Holi, called the Holika Dahan, or Chhoti Holi, where festival-goers gather around a

bonfire to celebrate the victory of good as evil is burned away in the fire. They also sing and dance and pray that any evil inside of them be destroyed. That's one of the seven legends to why Holi started, and it explains why people throw colorful powder at each other.
