Q: What is the Science of Reading?

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A: The science of reading includes a body of substantial integrative research (including developmental psychology, educational psychology, cognitive science, and cognitive neuroscience).

It outlines the methods that best help children learn to read.

Q: What are the top FIVE most important habits to foster when supporting a young reader?





Know the Code: Focusing on the Alphabet and Phonemic Awareness



"If a child memorizes ten words, then the child can read ten words. But, if the child can learn the sounds of ten letters, the child can read...

350 three-sound words,


4,320 four-sound words, and

21,650 five-sound words."





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Help children learn how to break sentences into words.





Breaking Sentences Into Words (Sample Discussions)

Adult: I will say a sentence. Tell me how many words there are in the sentence. "There is a small blue bird." Child: There is a small blue bird...4 words.

Adult: Say a sentence and tell me how many words there are in the sentence. Child: (e.g., The dog is cute. 4!)





Help children sound out words smoothly.

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An Example of Mindful (and Fun!) Reading Time



Comprehension strategies refer to the repeatable things we do while reading that allow us to understand a text:

Simply Put... Good Comprehension = READING MINDFULLY!



Summarizing/Monitoring (PK-3)

- So, what's happened so far is...
 The important things that happened so far are...
- The characters in the story are...
- I am (or am not!) able to remember what happened...Let me go back and read.
- I read a lot. Let me stop and name what happened so far.
- Some important words I learned are...

Self-Questioning (PK-3)

- Can I tell what happened so far?
 What is most important about what I just read?
- What words did I learn that are important to this topic?
- Did I learn anything new or important? If so, can I tell it to another person? If not, what should I do?
- Did I look at all the parts of the book (words, pictures, captions)?

Visualizing (Grades 2+)

- Mid-grade 2 and up
- Start as a guided visualization process
 - Read a chunk of text
 - Prompt: make a picture in your head of the setting (child describes aloud).
 - Read another chunk of text
 - **Prompt:** now, close your eyes and see the characters in your setting.
 - Read another chunk of text
 - **Prompt:** now, close your eyes and see the characters' problem.
 - Continue with attempt to solve problem, solution,
 and lessons learned.



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Q: My child only reads one type/genre of books. How do I help them diversify their reading repertoire?





A: While it is beneficial to support a child's exposure to diverse genres and text formats, it is MOST important that a child loves reading.

If they love a certain kind of book, celebrate that. Bring new genres and text formats into your shared reading time. Model curiosity and interact with the text as if it is a new treasure. Even calling it "New" or "Uncovered" Treasure can bring a positive tone to the interaction.

The key--how YOU react matters. Be sincere in what you find interesting or compelling about whatever you read! Q: Can you suggest some resources (apps, book recommendations, websites) to support reading at home?

Be a cheerleader. Avoid being a literature judge.






Q: How do I support reading if English is not my first language? Also, how do I support my multilingual child in reading books in more than one language?
